



NEVADA SESQUICENTENNIAL LICENSE PLATE FACT SHEET

- In June 2013, both houses of the Nevada Legislature approved and Governor Brian Sandoval signed AB46, authorizing the creation of a special Nevada Sesquicentennial license plate in recognition of the 150th anniversary of Nevada's admission into the union.
- The Sesquicentennial license plate is unique among all plates in Nevada and in the country. The design of the vintage-style plates features a dark blue background and the Battle Born state logo. The embossing of the plate is reflective of the original Nevada-embossed license plates.
- Nevada officials worked closely with the state's law enforcement to ensure public safety, one of the state's highest priorities, including optimum visibility and reflectivity of every license plate. In order to ensure that the plates were visible and adhered to strict public safety guidelines, a regional partner located in neighboring Oregon was contracted to replicate this one-time special plate. Oregon is the only state in the nation to offer the specialized technology. Other portions of the production process surrounding these plates is taking place at the Nevada State Prison including administrative components, repackaging and shipping of plates to DMV offices statewide.
- The plates have been embraced statewide since their July launch, selling over 3,300 plates and raising more than \$65,000 for the Sesquicentennial Commission to fund Nevada's yearlong 150th birthday celebration.
- The Nevada 150 specialty license plates are available for purchase at the Nevada Department of Motor Vehicle offices around the state. Visit www.dmvnv.gov for more information. The fee for the plate is \$33.50 with an annual renewal fee of \$20. The Nevada 150 Foundation will receive \$25 per plate to support legacy projects and special events related to the yearlong Nevada 150 celebration.
- The limited-edition plates will be available for purchase through 2016, making the Battle Born plate a commemorative item for all Nevadans.
- Souvenir plates will be made at the tag plant in Nevada, which are available for display use only.
